Employees are chosen based on stringent screening, with an emphasis on their technical skills and dedication to improving the quality of education.

**Employee Welfare Measures**: **Teaching Faculty**: Contributions towards provident fund, maternity leave policy for faculty members, support for conference participation and project presentations, incentives for funded projects and sci/scie indexed journals, revenue sharing in consultancy projects reimbursement of nptel exam fees transport facilities for consultancy assignments admission benefits for faculty's children ambulance facility support for Ph.D. Pursuits, Vacation benefits staff sports, OD & TA, and DA, provision of meals at no cost to grade 4 employees. Pay fixation: the pay scale for chosen candidates is determined by the selection committee, ensuring equitable compensation based on qualifications and experience. Additional increments are awarded for exceptional performance, research contributions, and other achievements, promoting a merit-based approach.

**Diversity and Inclusion Programs**: DSU has put in place programs to foster diversity and inclusion among students, faculty, and staff. Scholarships and support mechanisms are available for underrepresented groups. Training programs and awareness campaigns aid in creating an inclusive campus atmosphere.

**Research and Innovation**: DSU is actively involved in research that addresses inequalities, including disparities in healthcare, gender inequality, and income inequality. Research activities contribute to understanding and mitigating societal issues related to inequality. 

The Tamil Nadu State Commission constituted for safeguarding the interests of Scheduled caste/ Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Class, Religious and Linguistic Minorities in Tamil Nadu by setting up the act in 1988 and 1989.

The Tamil Nadu State Government notified the Scheduled caste/ Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Class, Religious and Linguistic Minorities as follows

- Persons belonging to the most economically and socio-culturally disadvantaged groups in India are the Scheduled Castes (SCs) and Scheduled Tribes (STs).
- The Other Backward Class is a collective term used by the Government of India to classify castes which are educationally or socially backward. It is one of several official classifications of the population of India, along with General castes, Scheduled Castes, and Scheduled Tribes (SCs and STs).
- Persons belonging to the communities of Christian, Muslim, Sikh, Buddhist, Parsi and Jain are considered as "Religious Minority".
- Persons belonging to the Minority communities who are natives of Tamil Nadu and having Telugu, Urdu, Kannada, Malayalam, Sourashtra and Marathi as their mother tongue as "Linguistic Minorities".
